




All elements have theory associated with them


- Who are they?


- Characteristics of data
 - Quality
 - Sparseness
 - Velocity
- Display theory
 - Graphics vs. text
- Characteristics of the innovation (thing being reported on)
 - Perception of evidence
 - Complexity of innovation
 - Prescribing a single drug vs. improving surgical outcomes

- Many issues
 - Hierarchy
 - Perceptions of the environment
 - Workflow fit
 - Actionability (timeliness, planning, other issues)
 - Sign of the intervention
 - Regulatory focus
 - Punitive vs. non-punitive environment
 - Individual goal setting






Using regulatory focus theory combining context with recipient...


Perception of sign in a non-punitive environment
